Background of SUD Services

- The opioid epidemic is still surging
 - Overdose deaths are significantly higher than they were in 2019
- Criminal justice & deinstitutionalization cost savings
 - Funds haven't reached OASAS or providers

Focus on Mental Health

- Focus on mental health should be lauded
- Two major concerns:
 - Substance use is not a priority
 - Workforce









- Expanding Certified
 Community Behavioral Health
 Clinic (CCBHC) agencies and
 providing a joint license
- Establishing an Indigent Care Program for CCBHC-Ds
- Expanding Office of Mental Health (OMH) residential and supported housing units
- Creating a Qualified Mental Health Associate for OMH
- Expanding Crisis Stabilization Centers and Mobile Crisis Intervention Services

- Adjusting Preauthorization and Concurrent Reviews Rules
- Authorizes Right of Action for Behavioral Health Parity Commercial Violations
- Mandating Commercial Reimbursement for School-Based Mental Health Clinic Services
- Matching Telehealth
 Commercial Reimbursement
 Rates





Proposals That Need Adjustments

- Minor increases in OASAS funding for:
 - Outpatient Medicaid
 - Residential
 - Crisis
 - Jail-Based SUD
 - Prevention and other services
- These should be increased





2.5% Human Services COLA

- It's not enough
 - COLAs cover operating costs
 - Food, rent,
 construction,
 transportation, health
 insurance, and more
 have all increased
- Other sectors are receiving 5%







Workforce

- Proposals do not address the workforce crisis
 - si billion investment with \$890m going to capital projects
- Turnover harms the people we support
- What happens when all these new projects open and there's no one to staff them?

Short-Term: Fund the COLA

- 8.5% COLA (tied to CPI)
 - Thank you for last year's 5.4% COLA!
 - Was the first significant COLA our sector in over a decade
 - Took months or longer to arrive
- Will help us to compete with the other sectors





Long-Term Ideas

- Encourage more people to get into behavioral health
 - Extend the workforce, especially with peers
- Provide scholarships
- Student loan forgiveness
 - Federal PSLF at 10 years





Workforce Stories

- Prevention challenges
 - Shannon Ford (GCASA):
 - Increasing services and demand
 - Not being able to find qualified staff
- Treatment challenges
 - Gulsum Silluzio (Horizon Health):
 - School-based services and expansions
 - Patient complexity for new hires
